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

IT'S TIME TO END THE SUFFERING

FROM COPPER STORAGE DISEASE

Copper storage disease is a potentially life threatening condition in dogs caused by an abnormal accumulation of copper in a dogs liver. This leads to progressive damage and scarring. Excessive and prolonged exposure from man made copper in dog food, leads to cirrhosis and as in Dr. Pete's dog Cookies case, death.

SYMPTOMS

Your dog may display some or all of these symptoms: Lethargy, anorexia, depression, vomiting, jaundice, anemia, dark urine, and blood in urine.

SOLUTIONS

The best solution is prevention; feeding a dog food that does not contain chelated coppers, copper sulphate or copper proteinate to avoid the accumulation of copper in the liver in the first place. Full recovery from copper-induced hepatopathy is rare. At the very least, your dog will need to follow a strict diet, probably for the rest of it's life. Dogs with severe cases will need long term medication. If your dog is displaying symptoms, consult your veterinarian immediately with your concerns.

GOOD COPPER

Natural copper is essential to all living organisms as a trace dietary mineral. It can be found in it's natural form in many plant and animal products. Excess natural copper is easily eliminated from the body when not needed

BAD COPPER

Chelated copper, copper sulfate or copper proteinate are manmade and are not easily expelled from the dogs liver. Excessive amounts in a dogs diet over time may become toxic, leading to progressive damage and in some cases death.



FOLLOW THESE TIPS FOR A GREAT ADVENTURE CAMPING WITH YOUR OUTDOOR COMPANION



Make sure your dog
is up-to-date on
vaccinations: Before
going camping,
ensure that your dog
is vaccinated against
diseases like rabies,
leptospirosis, and Lyme
disease. Also, bring
copies of your dog's
vaccination records with
you on the trip.



Keep your dog on a leash: While it may be tempting to let your dog roam free, it's important to keep them on a leash at all times. This will prevent them from running off, getting lost, or getting into dangerous situations with other animals.



Keep a close eye on your dog's feet and coat for cuts, ticks, burrs, and other potential hazards. Regularly inspect their paws and fur after outdoor adventures. Swiftly remove any ticks to prevent tick-borne diseases, and promptly treat any cuts to avoid infections. Brushing your dog's coat at the end of a day in the woods can help spot anything needing attention.



Be mindful of the weather: Dogs are sensitive to extreme weather conditions, so it's important to monitor the temperature and adjust your plans accordingly.

Bring a dog-friendly tent or shelter for your dog to rest in during the day.



Clean up after your dog: Always pick up your dog's waste and dispose of it properly.

Not only is it unsightly, but it's also harmful to the environment and can attract other animals to your campsite.

the original dog that had diverged from a common ancestor with the gray wolf had gone extinct. Around that time, the basenji emerged as the first and oldest modern dog species. Smart and independent, the so-called African "barkless dog" is still recognized by the American Kennel Club today.



10,000 years ago

DOGS GET JOBS

During the Agricultural Revolution, upon settling down on farms, humans bred dogs with characteristics favorable to specific agricultural tasks like herding livestock, protecting chickens, pigs, and other farm animals; finding any lost farm animals.



5,300 years ago

DOGS GET LEASHES AND COLLARS

The early Mesopotamians urbanized dogs, and city dogs need leashes and collars.

ST. HUBERT BREEDS HIS HOUNDS

In the seventh century, a French monk named Hubert, later to be sainted, began breeding what would come to be known as St. Hubert's hounds.


THE GUIDE DOG MOVEMENT IS BORN

Joanne Lefson, on her expedition
to Everest Base Camp in 2012. While

at an altitude of 5,364 meters
(17,598 feet).

It provides a unique opportunity to understand the responsibilities and care that come with owning a dog, helping individuals or families determine if they are truly ready to take on the lifelong commitment.

THINGS TO KNOW WHEN YOU RESCUE

Consider these factors when adopting a rescue dog. Consulting with a veterinarian during the process will provide further guidance and help ensure a smooth transition for both you and your new furry family member.

1.

Health Evaluation

Ensure the rescue dog has received a comprehensive health evaluation by a veterinarian. This includes a physical examination, vaccinations, testing for common diseases, and screening for parasites like fleas, ticks, and worms.



Behavior Assessment

Assess the dog's behavior and temperament. Observe their interactions with people and other animals to determine their compatibility or potential challenges with your household.



Medical History

Obtain the dog's medical history from the rescue organization or previous owner. It should include information about past illnesses, injuries, surgeries, and ongoing medical conditions. This knowledge will help you understand the dog's healthcare needs and potential future treatments.



Spay/Neuter Status

Ensure the dog has been spayed or neutered, or confirm that arrangements will be made for the procedure shortly after adoption. Spaying or neutering not only prevents unwanted litters but also offers health benefits and can reduce certain behavioral issues.




Vaccination and **Preventative Care**

KEEP THESE SIX THINGS IN MIND AND, YOU ARE READY TO PROVIDE A LOVING AND SUPPORTIVE TEMPORARY HOME FOR A FOSTER DOG IN NEED.

1 Time and Commitment Fostering a dog requires a significant amount of time, attention, and dedication. Ensure that you have the availability to provide proper care and meet their needs.

2 Patience and Flexibility Dogs coming from difficult situations may require extra patience and understanding. Be prepared to work through any behavioral issues or trauma they may have experienced.

3 Resources and Finances

Fostering a dog comes with expenses such as food, supplies, and potential veterinary care. Make sure you have the necessary resources and financial stability to provide for their well-being.

4 Home Environment



Introducing the Crate with Positivity and Patience



Being on a television commercial, Instagram ad or having top placement in your local pet store doesn't mean a medication works. Something is effective if it produces the desired results, which can vary greatly in the case of flea and tick medications, let me explain. About fifty years ago, we made the decision to try to eradicate fleas. To do this, we used pyrethrin, a pesticide derived from chrysanthemums. That worked pretty well at first, but then it stopped working. Then we created a synthetic pyrethrin called permethrin, which initially performed well until it didn't. Then we tried a chlorinated hydrocarbon, which was effective for a while before it failed as well. Then we switched to organic phosphates, which performed admirably for a while but are actually quite deadly. Then there is Revolution, a topical macrolide that initially worked well before failing. This takes us to the two nonsystemic chemicals that are currently most in demand: Frontline (and other fipronil based generics), which is also used in agriculture, and Advantage (and other imidacloprid based generics), which is frequently used to eliminate grubs and other pests in lawns. And as you might expect given how frequently they are utilized, both of these highly publicized solutions are no longer very efficient. Let's dig deeper.

What has happened in our yearly battle to eradicate fleas and ticks and safeguard our pets is that through consistent use of the same products year after year, we have killed many of the insects, but the few that manage to evade our barrage of chemicals have grown stronger and resistant, or as I like to say "tolerant" to them. And yes, the chemical may kill them, but it can take days, so by the time the pesky insects die, they will have consumed food and reproduced, creating more insects that are even more tolerant to the drugs that were being used – thus the vicious cycle continues. That said, they continue to make more drugs and lucky for us, there are several recent medications, like Credelio, Nexgard, Simparica, and Bravecto, for which tolerances have not yet developed. Also, one of the best qualities of these new drugs is that they kill things rapidly which is crucial because as I indicated, these suckers multiply quickly. Now, the problem isn't the medications themselves, it's that all of these worthless medications are still being widely promoted in advertising as the top flea and tick treatment in the US. So, that is what gets picked up an used on a grand scale with the understanding that it's going to work everywhere. Which is simply not true.

People could assume that I don't support flea and tick prevention because this seems so gloom and doom. Not at all true. I am, however, a pretty black and white guy, and for me to be true to my promise as a vet, I think it's crucial for folks to understand that sometimes just supplying the most well-liked box of pills they've seen on TV or Instagram isn't the quick solution to their dogs protection and health. What should they do? People should trust their veterinarian and heed their recommendations since they are knowledgeable about what is beneficial in their area, which medications have worked, which ones have tolerances, and which ones are probably not going to do a damn thing. We as vets make it our business to be aware of what everyone is doing, what works, what doesn't, and which magic tricks we can pull out of a hat if necessary. People aren't thinking about tick tolerances, but we as vets make it our businesses to know just that and so we are thinking about this stuff all the time. As I like to tell my clients, you don't need to treat the treatable, if you properly prevent the preventable. Moral of the story? Trust your veterinarian to help you prevent the preventable.

"ROVER HATES PILLS, AND I HATE GIVING PILLS TO ROVER"

Without a doubt, giving dogs pills is no picnic. If you prefer not to give your dog pills, there are topical drugs available, but before making that decision, it's good to be educated on why one versus the other. In the case of topical medications, most have limited effectiveness (outside of Bravecto topical Revolution plus and Advantage Multi), this is due to the fact that they don't reach all parts of your dogs body. When you apply a topical, the drug only stays in the skin's oils, making it less effective

the further away from the application site you get. Another disadvantage of topicals is that they can wear off easily, especially if your dog loves swimming or rolling in the dirt. In contrast, pills are systemic, they are evenly distributed throughout the body and provide more thorough protection all the way from the ears to the tail to the toes. Talk to your veterinarian and let them help you make the most educated choice for your dog.

BONUS TIP: HOW TO REMOVE A TICK

It's important to do so safely and carefully to avoid leaving any parts of the tick behind that can cause an infection. Here's what to do:



Ticks can't see and rely on sensing CO₂ to locate their hosts.


- 1. Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to your dog's skin as possible.
- 2. Pull upward with steady, even pressure. Don't twist or jerk the tick, as this can cause the mouth parts to break off and remain in your dog's skin.
- 3. If any parts of the tick remain in your dog's skin, use the tweezers to remove them.
- 4. After removing the tick, clean the bite area with rubbing alcohol or soap and water.
- 5. Dispose of the tick by placing it in alcohol, flushing it down the toilet, or placing it in a sealed bag or container.

It's important to monitor your dog for any signs of illness or infection following a tick bite, such as fever, lethargy, or loss of appetite. If you notice any concerning symptoms, seek veterinary attention.



WONDER HOW A TICK WORKS?


A tick sucks blood out of its host and then it commingles the blood in its salivary glands where it stores the lyme bacteria; Boriella. It then regurgitates it back into the dog because it's putting a topical anesthetic in there so the dog doesn't know what's going on. It also puts a blood thinner in there so it can get it back and forth, back and forth, back and forth, undetected as it's sucking all this blood out. The dog doesn't even know what's happening because they can't feel it.

Apple Carrot

2 Large carrots Peeled and Chopped

1 peeled chopped apple

½ Cup oat milk, water, apple juice or bone broth

Place all in blender, pour in a treat sized mold and freeze overnight.

SWEET PUPTATO BISCUITS

Makes approximately 45 small biscuits

- ³/₄ cup mashed sweet potato* (generally 1 large sweet potato)
- 3 cups Rolled Oats
- 1/2 cup Creamy Natural Peanut Butter

Instructions

- Preheat oven to 250°F.
- ¾ cup mashed sweet potato (can substitute a can of pumpkin puree)
- Blend 2 cups of the rolled oats into oat flour (save 1 cup as whole oats)
- ½ cup peanut butter (natural, no sugar added is best if possible)
- In a bowl combine the rolled oats with the oat flour.
- Add the peanut butter and 3/4 cup mashed sweet potato to the oat blend and combine using your hands until a dough forms.
- You can press into a silicone mold, roll into a log and slice, or roll flat (about 3/4" - 1") and cut with cookie cutters or into squares.
- Bake the treat at 250°F for 2 hours.
- Transfer treats to a wire rack to cool.

*How to bake your sweet potato: poke and bake at 400°F for 45 to 60 minutes or until done (it's done when you can easily insert a fork into the middle), cool and remove skin.




